In this talk Alvin Hall shares his memories, insights, images and interviews from his six day trip through the south using a real issue of *The Negro Motorist Green Book*. His experience and gathered stories address the risks of both living and driving while black during Jim Crow and segregation and how the problems that lead Victor Hugo Green to create the annual book (1936–1967), listing places where African Americans could find "safe harbor," remains a contemporary issue in the United States.

Alvin Hall is an internationally renowned financial educator, television and radio broadcaster, bestselling author, and regular contributor to magazines, newspapers, and websites.
